

Operation and maintenance

- All septic systems need to be operated properly.
- Septic systems are not trash cans.
- Owners are responsible for their septic systems.
- All septic systems need some level of maintenance; what is required depends on the system.

 All systems need to be pumped routinely to remove solids from sewage tanks.
